Kathmandu hosts Global Animal Conference

December 6, Ryan Chang

Hundreds of experts from the world's leading animal welfare organizations concluded the three-day Asia for Animals Conference in Kathmandu on Tuesday. Held for the first time in Nepal, It drew participants from over 45 countries.

Nepal's own pioneering conservationists and founder of the Chitwan National Park, Hemanta Raj Mishra, opened the conference. "It is encouraging to see that tiger poaching has gone down in recent years, while rhino numbers are increasing by the hundreds," He said.

Heart breaking footage of dogs, cats, and donkeys being mistreated were shown during the sessions, alongside success stories and case studies of community involvement around the world to improve animal welfare.

The theme for this year's conference was "Changing Human Behaviour', and indeed that was seen as the key to caring for animals in a meaningful way. Experts emphasized educating local communities across Asia on scientific and humane methods to interact with animals.

Indian environmentalist and historian Nanditha Krishna said: "You cannot succeed by just issuing laws. The only way we can change human behaviour is by going to village by village and talking."

Pramada Shah of Animal Nepal highlighted how Lalitpur and Kathmandu municipalities in Nepal have slowly changed their attitude towards what they used to see as 'stray' dogs. "What we want is a cruelty free society. It's innate in our culture." said Shah. "I'm positive; in this day and age that Nepalis are a progressive people."

DDC's yak cheese gets organic certification Kathmandu, Dec 4

Yak cheese produced by Dairy Development Corporation (DDC) has received Organic Certification Nepal (OCN).

The certificate was issued as per the national technical standards of Organic Agriculture Production and Processing System of Nepal, 2064 (amended 2065) and OCN standard.

OCN provided certification to DDC yak cheese amid an event organized in Kathmandu on Monday in the presence of representatives of OCN and DDC, as well as the Ministry of Livestock Development.

Speaking at the event, Umesh Lama of OCN said that orange sticker will be provided to DDC's yak cheese during the trial period. "We will give green sticker later on, " He said, adding: "We will now work to get international certification for yak cheese."

Once DDC's yak cheese gets international certification, it can be exported to different international markets.

Ishwari Prasad Adhikari, the spokesperson for the DDC, said that organic certification is important to promote yak farming and increasing production of yak milk. "Our product will get good price in the international market, once it receives international certification. Then we will be able to give good price to farmers", he added. Dolakha, Ramechhap and Solukhumbu are the leading producers of yak cheese in Nepal.

Koshi Tappu elephants kill 4 people in last 5 days AMAR KHADKA

ITAHARI, Dec 4

Wild elephant attacks have increased in the areas surrounding Koshi Tappu Wildlife Reserve in recent times. In the last five days, four people living in the areas near the reserve have lost their lives due to elephant attacks.

Bhubeshwar Sardar, a local of Koshi Rural Municipality-3, in Sunsari district, lost his wife, Swobia Devi, 42, in one such attack. "I had left home early in the morning for daily-wage work. When I returned home in the evening, I found that she was killed at home by wild elephants," he shared.

The incident happened on November 27. "Now whenever I hear about wild elephants entering the village, I get shivers down my spine. On Monday too, I heard people in the upper Mushahar settlement screaming when elephants entered their settlement and caused huge damage."

Wild elephants have been entering settlements almost on a daily basis of late, the locals said. They said they have to stay up late all night in fear. "We always fear for our lives whenever wild elephants enter the settlement," said Ugra Narayan Sardar, another local.

According to him, the authorities have however turned a blind eye to their woes. "Even as elephant attacks on humans and crops are increasing, the government has not shown any interest to resolve the problem, said Sardar.

This human-sized penguin isn't even the largest ancient penguin we know about

Today there are 17 species of penguin prowling the planet, and they are all firkin' adorable. New Zealand actually boasts the smallest extant species, which clocks in at an average of 13 inches tall. The biggest—the aptly-named Emperor Penguin—still only reaches 48 inches. Big for a bird, sure, but you're likely not intimidated by a waddling animal the size of a third grader.

Things used to be very different for our flightless friends. Based on its bones, researchers believe *Kumimanu biceae* a newly-discovered species, grew to be almost 6 feet tall, and may have weighed over 220 pounds. That's not even the biggest extinct penguin species we know of. Some 37 million years ago in Antarctica, there roamed a species that grew to stand 6 feet 8 inches tall. That's a LeBron James-sized penguin. To help you ponder that, we've found a picture of LeBron James standing next to actress Amy Schumerwho, at 5' 7", is a roughly-average-height human being. Please note that she is wearing heels, so this is actually what it would look like if an average-sized human *in high heels* stood next to the largest-known species of ancient penguin.

But study author Gerald Mayr of the Senckenberg Research Institute and Natural History Museum Frankfurt points out that it's not surprising some penguins were once big.

"Actually, it is often observed that flightless birds become very large," he told *PopSci*via email. "One rather has to answer the question why there are no giant penguins today."

The new species helps to answer that question by filling in some of the evolutionary history of the lineage. *Kumimanu biceae* is one of the geologically oldest penguins ever found, putting it close to the base of the penguin family tree. Most other giant penguins (that we know of) came on the scene tens of millions of years later. And there are relatives between *Kumimanu biceae* and those later cousins that were quite small, suggesting their gigantism evolved in different times and places.

BHAIRAHAWA, DEC 18

Bhairahawa locals whose land was acquired by the Gautam Buddha International Airport project have halted construction work to protest delays in payment of compensation.

On Monday, agitating landowners padlocked the main entrance to the airport construction site demanding that authorities make early payment of the compensation amount as agreed earlier.

The entrance is used to take construction materials to the site. The farmers who lost their land complained that they were facing hassles to get their rightful compensation.

The project-affected farmers charged the project management of not working to facilitate payment of the compensation amount. They also accused employees at government offices such as the survey department of delaying issuing the paperwork required to obtain their money.

Landowners complained that government officials have been demanding money in exchange for faster service. Recently, middlemen have also started surfacing offering to get the paperwork done promptly for a 2-3 percent commission, they said.

"We had asked authorities to ease the compensation process, but they didn't listen to us. The farmers made the rounds of various government offices for months to collect their rightful compensation, but still nothing happened," said Suraj Prasad Barai, one of the farmers based in Siddharthanagar Municipality-10 whose land was taken over by the airport project.

The farmers said that after their land was acquired, they could not grow anything on it or get compensation. This has put an economic burden on our lives, they said. The farmers had staged a protest with the same demand about one and a half months ago.

Project chief Om Sharma said that lack of adequate manpower at the land survey office was causing delays in marking land plots for providing compensation. Because of this, farmers are foced to wait for days to get their money, he said.

Sharma added that they had written to the Department of Land Survey to assign five surveyors to work solely on the airport construction site so that farmers could receive their compensation on time.

The airport in Bhairahawa, the gateway to the pilgrimage destination of Lumbini in south central Nepal, is being upgraded to a fully equipped international airport. The airport now covers an area of 787 bighas after an additional 500 bighas was acquired some two years ago.

More than 2000 people were displaced due to land acquisition for the airport upgradation project. The project has set aside Rs. 23 billion to be distributed as compensation to farmers. Of this, only Rs3.5 billion for 70 bighas has been distributed so far. The project is expected to be complete by early 2019.

Kathmandu: Toni Hagen, the late geologist from Switzerland, first visited Nepal in 1950 with a Swiss Development Assistance Mission to Nepal. Hagen, who was employed by Nepal Government in 1952, travelled around 14000 km across the nation, and during that time he captured the country in his many photographs.
